First of all, I am so glad to be the first group of student from PBIC Thammasat University, Thailand and be able to take a part of student life in Kyoto University in Japan. The purpose of my study is to understand and achieve all objectives of both GSE of Kyoto University and PBIC of Thammasat University in a given two months including develop an academic research topic with high standard that could be beneficial to regional and international level. As one of my motivation, I believe that my profession's background and economic knowledge will fit the requirements of this program. That is sound serious, but I also have another personal goal while living in Japan.
