次世代研究者の国際交流

1月11·12日の2日間、次世代グローバルワークショップが稲盛財団記念館において開催されました。GCOEの人材育成プログラムの一環で、博士課程学生を主な対象としてキャリア支援(英語発表の機会、企画・実施・発信力の体得)、海外研究者との交流を推進することを目的としたものです。

私自身、海外学会での英語発表というのはとてもハードルが高いように感じていました。このワークショップでは、事前にプレゼンティション講習会や英語論文のネイティヴチェックもあり、私のような未経験者でも参加しやすい貴重な場でした。さらに、当日の報告だけではなく、運営経験を積めることもなかなかないチャンスだと思います。学生では学会準備なども言われたことをするだけですが、今回は学生も含めた運営委員会が組織されました。プログラム作成、ポスターのデザイン、当日の運営までを経験することができました。

参加者は、報告者 54 名 (日本 28 名、海外 26 名)、海外からのアドバイザー 7 名、その他 40 名でした。報告は、家族、セクシャリティー、福祉、移民など 15 セッションに分かれ、それぞれの司会は学生がつとめました。外は雪が舞う寒い日



でしたが、白熱した議論が交わされ、大変刺激的な2日間でした。第1回で課題は残されましたが、次世代研究者が交流して、新しい扉を開いたように思います。

翌13日には、西陣(町家と西陣織・茶道)、伏見の酒蔵(産業遺産)、大阪・釜ヶ崎(労働者街)と3コースのフィールドトリップが行われました。私は西陣に行きましたが、町の中を歩きながら選挙ポスターを見て、日本の政治について話し出すこともありました。拙い英語で苦労しましたが、後日、海外参加者の方にプレゼントや、今度また話をしようというメールをいただき、感激しました。

親密圏や公共圏に関する議論の際、それぞれの社会的・文化的状況が前提となり、まず相互の文化理解が必要だというご意見がありました。海外参加者の方に欧米的な学会スタイル以外に「日本」に触れてもらうという点からはフィールドトリップも役に立つと思われます。残念ながら国内参加者は少なかったのですが、日頃意識していない自文化の理解と説明の機会になり、さらに深い交流にもつながると感じました。次回のワークショップではどんな交流があるのか楽しみです。

International Cultural Exchange with Next Generation Researchers

On January 11th and 12th the Next-generation Global Workshop took place at the Inamori Foundation Memorial Hall. As part of the GCOE human resources development program, career support, aimed mainly at Ph.D. students, is focusing on promoting international cultural exchange with foreign researchers.

Despite my poor English and lack of experience, this workshop was easy to participate in and was an invaluable occasion. We also had the chance to take part in its operation and administration which enabled us to experience everything from the preparation of the program to the design of posters, and to the running of the workshop.

There were 54 presenters (28 from Japan, 26 from overseas), 7 foreign advisers and 40 others. The presentations were divided into 15 categories which included "family", "sexuality", "welfare", and "immigration", and each was presided by a student. These were two very stimulating days full of exciting debates. Since this was the first one, there was much left to discuss, but I think that many doors were opened

through the exchange of Next-generation Researchers.

The following day, three field-trips were held: Nishijin in Kyoto (traditional houses, nishijin-brocade and the Tea Ceremony), the Fushimi Rice Wine (Sake) Brewery area (industrial heritage site) and Kamagasaki in Osaka (day-laborers' community). I chose Nishijin. We saw election posters and talked about politics. It was hard with my limited English, but I was jubilant because some days later I received presents and emails from overseas participants inviting me to continue the conversation.

When discussing the intimate and public spheres, social and cultural backgrounds become premises, so mutual cultural understanding is necessary. For overseas participants these field-trips were potential to provide a chance to experience Japan. It was a shame that there were few participants from Japan. But I personally felt that explaining for overseas participants gave us the opportunity to deepen our own cultural understanding, which in turn led to a more profound cultural exchange. I am looking forward eagerly to the next workshop.




