

第3回次世代グローバルワークショップ 「人の国際移動 ―親密圏と公共圏のグローバルな再編成―」

去る12月11日と12日の2日間にわたり、京都大学文学部新館にて第3回次世代グローバルワークショップが開催されました。若手研究者に開かれた世界的なレベルの場で発表できるチャンスということで、国内からは京都大学を中心として23名、海外からは26名の発表者（15地域19機関）がありました。海外からの参加地域は前年度より3地域増え、よりグローバルな研究発表の場となりました。

今回の全体テーマは「グローバリゼーションと移民」でした。そこからさらに「外部化されるケア」や「国境を超えるアイデンティティ」といった14のセッションに分けられ、3会場において発表がおこなわれました。

私も発表者の1人として初めて参加したのですが、このワークショップの各セッションにて、経験と学識の豊富な海外パートナー拠点の先生方（15名）がアドバイザーとしてコメントされるのはとてもよいシステムだと感じました。限られたセッ

The 3rd Next-Generation Global Workshop “Migration: Global Reconstruction of Intimate and Public Spheres”

For two days over the 11th and 12th of December 2010, the 3rd Next-Generation Global Workshop was held at the main building of Kyoto University’s Faculty of Letters. This was a great opportunity for young researchers to give presentations at a global level, and there were 23 presenters from Japan, mainly from Kyoto University, and 26 presenters from overseas (15 regions, 19 institutions). The number of overseas regions represented by participants increased by 3 over the previous year, making this into an even more global forum.

This 3rd workshop’s overall theme was globalization and migration. Presentations were given in three different venues and divided into 14 sessions, covering topics such as “away from care” and “transgressing identity.”

I participated as a presenter for the first time, and felt that it provided an excellent system, as in each session of this workshop we could be given comments from the various professors (15 in total) from our overseas partner institutions, with their rich experience and knowledge. Even in the limited time allowed for each session, I was

In connection with this 3rd workshop’s theme, there was a lecture on the morning of the second day from Dr. Brenda Yeoh (Professor at Singapore National University) who has made her name in migration research, and in addition to gaining a sense of the overall inter-connectivity of the workshop, I was also able to catch up on the status of the latest research.

After the workshop ended we continued in-depth discussions in other locations with enthusiastic young participants from overseas. The official workshops had limited time, but when I was talking with other people later, we exchanged ideas and information not just on the contents of our research, but about different cultures and societies, giving us the opportunity to learn about each other. I hope to maintain this research network with the young researchers I met at these places. I look forward to even more young researchers participating in upcoming Next-Generation Global Workshops, and to the creation of wider networks.
