

ソウル大学・京都大学共催 第4回次世代グローバルワークショップ 「国民国家を超えてーグローバル化における親密圏と公共圏ー」

本グローバルCOEプログラムの主要な活動のひとつである、第4回次世代グローバルワークショップが開催されました。次世代グローバルワークショップは、若手研究者に研究報告のチャンスと、世界各地の同世代の研究者たちとの対話の場を提供すべく毎年開催されています。今年はソウル大学と京都大学グローバルCOEプログラムによる初めての共催となり、さらに初の日本国外での開催で、2011年11月24日から25日にかけてソウル大学にておこなわれました。11のセッションが設けられ、29名の海外からの報告者および9名の日本からの報告者が集い、非常に盛況のうちに終了しました。私自身もオーガナイザーとしてはもちろんのこと、報告者と

しても初めてこのワークショップに参加し、この機会に長期研究プロジェクト「東アジアのポスト工業社会における労働の再定義」の概要と研究計画を発表しました。世界中の研究者が聴衆となって私の報告に注目し、有益なコメントを得られたことは、私個人にとって大変貴重な体験となりました。オーガナイザーと報告者の両方の立場から次世代グローバルワークショップを経験して確信したのは、このワークショップが（私を含む）若手研究者の研究の発展のためにグローバルかつ相対的見地を涵養する場を提供しているだけではなく、よりよいコミュニティ、社会、世界という次世代の展望の実現に不可欠な、国際ネットワークを形成する場となっていることでした。

The 4th Next-Generation Global Workshop “Nation-States and Beyond : Private and Public Spheres under Globalization” Co-Organized by Seoul National University & Kyoto University

We held a very exciting workshop in last November. It was the 4th Next-Generation Global Workshop which is one of the major activities of Global COE. The Next-Generation Global Workshop is held every year with the purpose of offering early career scholars an opportunity to give presentations and engage in dialogue with scholars of the same generation from various parts of the world. This year, it was for the first time jointly hosted by Seoul National University and Kyoto University Global COE Program. Moreover, also for the first time, it was held outside of Japan and was held in Seoul National University, Seoul from November 24-25, 2011. The workshop was a great success with 11 sessions with 29 overseas presenters and 9 presenters from Japan.


For the first time, I also joined the workshop not only as
